

As a preacher, my ears are always open for a good turn of a phrase. When I am taken by what I hear, I will invariably make use of it myself at some point in the future. For instance, on the day of my father's funeral, the pastor said, "See you later, Al. We Christians don't say, 'Goodbye.' We say, 'See you later.'" I can't tell you how many times I've said something similar for nearly twenty-two years now. First hearing it from another



preacher, I've also recycled "unwelcome fraternity" as I've interacted with those who have buried a member of their family at a younger than usual age. Even so, this newsletter article will be the first time I've recycled something I first heard in church in the mid-90's before I was even thinking about going to seminary.

The remark was made in Oshkosh, Wisconsin where my mother Janice was born and raised. My mother's father Orville was a sickly man I never knew. While alive, he would take the family to religious revivals held in various locales as he sought a cure for his diseased kidneys. Far removed from what my mother would become when she married my very German and very Lutheran father, the family was Pentecostal. When my grandfather died in his forties, my


grandmother Beulah eventually remarried, and she and her second husband became active members at Wesley United Methodist Church. For much of my childhood, that congregation worshipped in a multipurpose room where fellowship meals and other events were held when the space wasn't being used for worship. Eventually, enough money was raised to build a sanctuary. It was in the new sanctuary where I preached my first "sermon" in 1998 when I was one of the speakers who gave thanks for the life of my grandmother's second husband, and the only "grandfather" I ever knew, a man by the name of Adolph Binder. But on another occasion, not long after the new sanctuary had come into use, I was present when the pastor serving the congregation at the time began his sermon by speaking of someone who had died and then later identifying the person who had died as "somebody else." Once the cat was out of the bag, he repeatedly called the congregation to greater commitment and participation by again and again saying, "Somebody else has died at Wesley United Methodist Church "

Having recently remembered this sermon, it has occurred to me that we find ourselves in a place like the one where Wesley United Methodist Church once found itself. Though not featuring a new sanctuary, a new phase of congregational history is underway, and it's been going well. In fact, it's been going well enough for there to be the time and the inclination to think about what's next for us. Throughout the fall and early winter, time and consideration were given to what we would be looking for in a called associate pastor. We now know we're looking for a people person who knows how to work as a member of a team, will be able to contribute to existing worship, education, and pastoral care ministries, and who shall be able to take our efforts related to social ministry and small groups to another level. Our local bishop has been made aware of our desires and a Call Committee is now waiting to interview candidates. But as this has been happening, we've also formulated other goals which will not reach the finish line unless we proceed as if somebody else is dead.

At a place like ALC, this can be hard to do. Some of us are only here for part of the year and there may be a strong temptation to treat the time away from home as a vacation. Additionally, most members have retired from their former career, and they may now be tempted to retire from active, committed congregational membership as well. Beyond this, there's always the continuing temptation to think someone else can do this or that better than I ever could. But I'm afraid none of this is consistent with the faith handed down to us.

No matter the time or season of life, Christians don't retire or coast. They "press on to the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus," (Philippians 3:14). While humble, Christians also don't sell themselves short. Instead, they humbly, but also confidently say to themselves, "I can do all things through him who strengthens me," (Philippians 4:13). So that the goals for 2024 listed later in this newsletter might be accomplished, I hope the ongoing, committed, never pass the buck faith handed down to us through Scripture and Christian tradition begins to take hold more and more at ALC. The goals we've set for 2024 are more than doable, but only if enough of us proceed as if "somebody else is dead."

INTRODUCING YOUR CALL COMMITTEE

The ALC Church Council met in a special session on Sunday, February 4th to approve the Ministry Site Profile for the position of Associate Pastor and appoint a Call Committee as outlined in our constitution. (As you will recall, Pastor David had been filling this position on an interim basis until he accepted a call to be the Senior Pastor at Grace Lutheran Church; and now in the meantime several former and area pastors have been scheduled to preach once each month and/or assist with the visitation of our shut-ins during the remainder of this vacancy.)

Karrie Burt, Flash Helm, Janet Keck, Steve Miedzybrocki, Alan Olson, Patti Phillips, Terri Polk, Glen Schulz, and Chip Skauge have been appointed by the council to serve on the Call Committee.

The Call Committee met immediately following the Council Meeting on the 4th to elect a chair and receive introductory information regarding this process. Glen Schulz was elected chair; and the committee learned that we would be guided through this entire process of searching for an Associate Pastor by a Transition Team from the Grand Canyon Synod. Pastor Phil Gustafson has been appointed by our Bishop to serve as our Transition Coach.

The Call Committee met again on February 6th for an initial meeting with our Transition Coach. Pastor Phil outlined the entire process and our responsibilities going forward. He indicated that our search would be posted by the synod office and would be distributed throughout the Grand Canyon Synod and nationally throughout the ELCA.

The search process has begun. Now, the Call Committee asks for your prayers and invites you to chat with any committee member regarding any questions or concerns you might have. We will keep you informed of progress as it occurs. We also invite you to share the name of a pastor whom you would like us to consider for this position. You may give this information to any committee member. While we cannot act on such a suggestion directly, we will forward the suggestion to our Transition Coach who will send it on to the office of our Bishop.

Thank you for your support of our committee and of the call process.

In Our Prayers

Scripture instructs us about the power and purpose of prayer. Our individual prayer lists may include many, many people. And we, at American Lutheran Church, wholeheartedly support all prayer ventures. Yet so that we can maintain an accurate and manageable prayer list for corporate worship and community life, the following 'prayer protocols' have been put into place.

A **prayer list 'booklet'** will be updated regularly and can be picked up in the narthex. This list includes those in hospice care or facing long-term challenges. Their names will remain on our prayer list until their personal circumstances change. The grieving and those who have died since the last All Saints Day will also remain on the list until we celebrate all the saints again in the fall. Members in need of healing, and family and friends for whom prayer requests have been made, will remain on the list for 3 weeks unless we are notified otherwise. These individuals will be contacted before their name is removed. For reasons of confidentiality, details of an individual's struggles can not be disclosed. During <u>corporate worship</u>, which is accessible to all through the world wide web, those individuals in hospice care and those on our 3-week cycle of prayer updates will be included in our intercessions.

We thank you for your patient understanding as we make the adjustments and adaptations called for in this day and age. If you have any questions or concerns please feel free to contact Pastor Julia.

Each year, our Lenten journey concludes with the observance of Holy Week. Holy Week is the center of the liturgical year; the Church's liturgies during this week commemorate the Paschal mystery. We observe with specificity the events in Jesus' life that led up to His death and resurrection. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday; we hear how the crowds of people shouted with joy "Hosanna!" and acclaimed Jesus as king as he entered Jerusalem ahead of Passover. Then on Maundy Thursday, we remember how Jesus established a new covenant with the salvation of humanity in mind during the Last Supper, giving us the sacrament of the Eucharist and his final command to his disciples: "to love one another as I have loved you." On Good Friday, we walk with Jesus as he suffered during his final hours; remembering how he was betrayed, was tortured, crucified, and ultimately died. On Holy Saturday during the Easter Vigil,

we transition from sorrow to joy, from darkness to light, as we announce once again that Christ is risen.

I look forward to these services each year; I hope you do as well. Each service is unique, unlike any of the services we experience throughout the rest of the year. The scripture lessons appointed for the Holy Week services speak to the core of our Christian beliefs. I especially love the music during Holy Week, beautiful hymns, choral music, and organ works that are only appropriate during this week of the church year. It should not be a surprise to you that for me, the music of Holy Week expresses the drama and emotions of the events that we commemorate.

Holy Week is a rollercoaster of emotions. This week reminds us that Jesus fully shared in our humanity, the good aspects as well as the bad. Whatever we may be going through, whatever we may have experienced, Jesus is with us. And just as Jesus rose from the dead, we can be assured of His promise to us that we too will share in His resurrection. I encourage you to attend as many

of our Holy Week services as you can. They are beautiful. Your faith will be enriched. You will celebrate with great joy the feast of Easter.

President Notes: March 2024

It is the season of Lent, not Thanksgiving, but in my reflections of late I have been considering how much that we of American Lutheran are blessed. As a snowbird – as so many of us are – I enjoy the warmer weather of Arizona and appreciate not being in Minnesota. But our



church is an important part of our lives, and I am so thankful that ALC is a strong and vibrant church community with many blessings and much to offer its people.

"The snowbird season" is in full swing at ALC, with events and activities and groups meeting almost daily. Opportunities are available not only for worship, but for involvement in the life of the church. I would especially note that Wednesday Night Alive programs continue through the month, with the 4:00 PM programs, followed by a meal and Lenten services to follow. But there are also Bible studies, Stephen Ministry, and a number of special groups. I hope many of our congregation will be able to attend the concert performance of the Rutter Requiem on the afternoon of March 10th, presented by our music department together with guest singers and musicians. Our church is truly alive and well, and I hope that we all, perhaps in different ways, can feel a part of it, and part of the greater body of the Christian faith.

As Pastor Scott has shared in services, we are in the process of seeking a new Associate Pastor. (See the article elsewhere in this issue by Glen Schulz, the Call Committee chair.) American Lutheran has not *called* an Associate Pastor since 1992. Since then we have relied on *contracted* Associate Pastors, that is, pastors who have been hired by the church on a contract basis, usually retired or semi-retired pastors. But there are fewer pastors available now – retired or otherwise – and the Church Council has decided that the call process offers a more promising way to attract a good candidate. That process is dictated by our Grand Canyon Synod, which mandates that we develop the Ministry Site Profile, appoint a call committee, and receive applications forwarded to us through the Synod. Once the call committee arrives at a recommended candidate. At this time we don't know how long the process will take.

The time of Lent is a special time in the church year -I suppose you could say that all times of the church year are special. But it is a time of reflection and prayer, as we prepare for the awe-inspiring celebration of our Lord's resurrection that is Easter. I encourage everyone to attend services and to pray for our church, for its future and its leadership. And surely our future will continue to be blessed.



ALC Hosts Free Flower Show March 2nd

The courtyard of American Lutheran Church will be the location for a free flower show on Saturday, March 2 from 10:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. Hosted by the Sun City chapter of Ikebana International, the flower arrangements on display will showcase the art of Japanese flower arranging. There is also a demonstration on the art of Ikebana at 12:00 noon in Room A/B. The public is invited to come by the Courtyard to see these beautiful arrangements and to attend the demonstration to learn how these artistic arrangements are formed. There is no cost to attend.

The motto of Ikebana International is "Friendship through Flowers." Ikebana International provides training in the art of flower arranging and supports Ikebana chapters throughout the world. The Sun City chapter of this group was formed over 50 years ago, and two years ago began renting space at ALC to hold their monthly meetings.

Ikebana began in ancient Japan when flowers were placed on religious altars. Through the centuries, Ikebana evolved into the art form it is today, with stems, leaves, blossoms, and branches – living material – forming the media of artistic expression. There are no competitions in Ikebana, but each arrangement is intended to be enjoyed for its own unique characteristics. Unlike "western" flower arranging, where multiple flowers are placed in a vase, in Ikebana there is an emphasis on form, line, color, and empty space to evoke an emotional response, sometimes through a single flower or branch.

The arrangements on display will showcase the range of Ikebana floral art by chapter members. After the exhibition, a few of the arrangements will be used to decorate the church's altar. Pat Forsythe, a member of American Lutheran, is coordinating the March 2 exhibition for the chapter. 2024 Goals Update Through February 18th

- **Each One Reach One**: In 2024, it's hoped at least 750 new visitors will come to ALC through each one reaching one. Thus far, new visitors have totaled 166.
- **Member Gifts Cover Ministry Costs in Full**: Estimated average weekly increase per member household is \$2.55 and we are on track.
- ALC Stickers Everywhere: Available in the narthex and with sightings sent to d.bautista@alcsuncity.org, total sightings of ALC stickers now totals 10.
- Attend Weekly Worship Often: January attendance was up slightly. February attendance was down slightly. The difference between last year and this year has so far been just 20 people. With ten months or so to go yet, we're at least holding steady.
- Save More For A Rainy Day: Estimated average weekly increase per household is \$2.22 and we are on track.
- Advertise in Every Issue of the Independent in Peoria, Sun City, Sun City Grand, Sun City West, and Peoria: Now happening.
- **Be Debt Free in Seven Years:** Estimated average weekly increase per household is \$1.95 and we are on track.
- Keep the New Members Coming: 52 received in 2023. 11 received in 2024.
- **Catch Up on Facility Upgrades:** Estimated average weekly increase per household is \$1.71 and we are \$.66 per week short.
- **Be Frugal and Faithful:** Ministry expenditures \$12,072 lower than a year ago, but no new monies yet for evangelism, social ministry, and wider Church support, with the weekly goal for those monies \$1.57.

NOTE: The various weekly giving increases provided above do add up to the \$10 extra dollars per week requested by the congregational council which itself pledged to increase giving by an average of \$25 per week in 2024. The overall request has been split into categories to encourage participation on the part of those who might find a weekly increase of \$10 a week to be too much. No matter their size, gifts should not be designated by category, but instead forwarded as a regular contribution.


